1.1	To present the option to scope out arrangements and business case for the provision of webcasting of Council Committee meetings, for future consideration.

Main Report

1.	Background and Context
1.1	<p><u>Background</u> The webcasting of democratic meetings offers a potential for improving how councils engage with their communities.</p>
1.2	<p>Webcasting is now undertaken in most local authorities across Wales. In the main, meetings judged to be of the most interest to the public are webcast, particularly Council, Cabinet (Executive) and Planning Committee meetings. A full breakdown of webcasting in other Welsh Council's is attached at appendix 2.</p>
1.3	<p>Although there is currently no requirement on local authorities to webcast their meetings, it is expected to become a mandatory requirement as part of the Welsh Government's Reforming Local Government Bill.</p>
1.4	<p>The Welsh Government has in the past assisted councils to promote democracy and engagement in local government by providing funding to broadcast council meetings. The total grant available to Blaenau Gwent was £42,000 for webcasting. Following acceptance of the grant the Council agreed a schedule of committee meetings to be webcast, when the existing funding ceased webcasting was discontinued.</p>
2.	Performance Evidence and Information
2.1	<p><u>WLGA Review of Webcasting</u> Following the original provision of webcasting, a review was undertaken by the WLGA who found webcasting:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provides more open and transparent governance and accountability. • Improves public engagement in and understanding of decision making. • Provides easier public access to meetings by minimising travel and allowing more flexible viewing times. • Can facilitate an increased understanding of the democratic functions of a Council by the public in line with the Local Government (Wales) Measure 2011. • Enables the public to access papers and presentations made at the meeting as well as see the meeting footage.

2.2 Across Wales, viewing figures for webcasts vary according to the type of meeting and authority, but generally the number of website hits suggests that there is a real and growing public interest in these broadcasts. Typically, there are more viewings of archived webcasts than live meetings.

2.3 **Blaenau Gwent’s Statistics 2014/15**

When Blaenau Gwent had the provision of webcasting we monitored the viewing statistics for every meeting and a snapshot of Blaenau Gwent’s viewing figures is provided below, covering 10 meetings in the 2014/15 cycle:

Note: These statistics count as unique hits – therefore, anyone from the same IP address going to the webcast several times will still only count as one view.

3. Risk Implications

3.1 **Option 1**
 There will be costing implications for webcasting should the scoping of the provision be agreed. These will need to be fully costed and included as part of the business case.

3.2 **Option 2**
 If the provision of webcasting is not approved, the Council will need to be mindful of how it responds to and prepares for any requirements that may be established in relation to the Welsh Government’s Reforming Local Government Bill.

6.2	Option 2 That the Democratic Services Committee do not recommend to Council that a business case for the provision of webcasting is developed.
7.	Impact Assessment Against Proposals / Options
7.1	Thinking for the long term The provision of webcasting supports long term thinking as it is expected to become mandatory as part of the White Paper.
7.2	Collaborative Other Council's webcast, particularly our partners in the SRS service. There may be opportunities for collaborative arrangements to be established in the future with regard to the provision of webcasting.
7.3	Involvement Webcasting supports involvement as it provides a more accessible opportunity for the public to become involved and understand the decision making of the Council.
8.	Conclusion
8.1	The provision of webcasting in other Welsh councils is showing to be a key aspect for the public to become involved in the decision making of councils as it provides a more transparent and accessible service.
8.2	Should it be approved for the Council to pursue the provision of webcasting, officers will be tasked with researching all options and providing these to Members at a future meeting of Democratic Services Committee.
