## **Main Report**

1.	Background and Context*
1.1	This Authority has a statutory duty under the Gambling Act 2005 to set fees for Premises Licences in accordance with the Gambling (Premises Licence) (England and Wales) Regulations 2007.  Premises Licences will include Betting Shops, Tracks, Adult Gaming Centres, Family Entertainment Centres and Bingo
	Premises.
1.2	The general functions of the licensing authority in dealing with Gambling Premises Licences, including the setting of licence fees, has been delegated to the Licensing Committee under the Constitution of the Authority
1.3	The Gambling (Premises Licence Fees) (England and Wales) Regulations 2007 provided for the following types of fees to be determined by licensing authorities:
	<ul> <li>Licence application fee</li> <li>First annual fee</li> <li>Annual fee</li> <li>Notification of change of circumstances fee</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Application to vary a licence fee</li> <li>Application to transfer a licence fee</li> <li>Fee for a copy of a licence</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Application for re-instatement of a licence fee</li> <li>Provisional statement application fee.</li> </ul>
	These Regulations stipulate a maximum figure a local authority is permitted to charge for the licensing of premises under the Gambling Act 2005. Local authorities are permitted to charge a fee based on reasonable cost recovery up to this maximum, but not above. Where the costs of the authority exceed the amount they are able to charge, this cost must be borne by the Authority.
	The maximum license fees that we are permitted to charge are shown in column 1 of Appendix 1.
1.4	The Authority currently licences the following premises under the Gambling Act 2005,
	Alcohol Licence Permit – 4 Club Machine Permit – 17

	Betting Office – 10 Adult Gaming Centre – 3
	The Alcohol Licence and Club Machine Permit fees are determined by Government, and do not therefore form part of this report.
	The licence fees currently being charged are shown in column 2 of Appendix 1
1.5	When calculating new licence fee costs, there is a range of legislation and guidance around fee setting for local authorities that must be taken into account. These include
	1 The Provision of Services Regulations 2009, which states that any charges provided for by a competent authority which applicants may incur under an authorisation scheme must be reasonable and proportionate to the cost of the procedures and formalities under the scheme and must not exceed the cost of those procedures and formalities.
	2 The guidance contained in Open for business: LGA guidance on locally set fees, and the BIS Guidance for Business on the Provision of Services Regulations
	3 Appropriate case law – and in particular to Hemmings v Westminster, which is still before the courts
1.6	Under the Provision of Services Regulations 2009, and confirmed in Hemmings V Westminster, only the administration and associated activities directly related to a licence can be charged as part of a licence fee. The costs of any investigation of unlicensed premises and other associated activities, and background activities such as FOI requests, statistical returns etc. cannot be included, and these costs must be borne by the Authority.
	The Hemmings v Westminster case is important, as it establishes that only certain matters may be charged as part of a licence fee.
	Licence fees may be subject to judicial review, and a small number of local authorities have been required to refund part of their licence fees going back a number of years where they have been found to be charging more than is permitted.
1.7	Local Authorities incur various direct and indirect costs in the administration and enforcement of licences, including

- 1 Implementation costs, including the costs of developing policies and setting fees, authorisation of officers, management of the licensing function etc.
- 2 Direct staff costs, including on-costs, travel, staff training etc. and including the costs of any senior managers, licensing committees etc. directly involved in the licensing process.
- Indirect costs that support the licensing function, such as general management functions, Legal, HR, finance, customer call centres etc.
- 4 Specialist equipment costs, particularly the use of specialist IT databases to record and report this work
- 5 Any third party costs used for inspection and enforcement etc.

Many of these costs are shared with other activities across the team and the department, and are therefore charged on a pro-rata basis.

- 1.8 In order to calculate the reasonable cost recovery for each type of fee, the following steps have been taken
  - 1 The licence steps and average time taken for each step, including the development of policies etc., have been calculated. For simplicity, licences have been grouped based on the lower level of activity expected because the time taken can be variable within each group.
  - 2 On-costs and indirect costs have been calculated by the finance team
  - 3 Specialist costs and similar have been based on invoiced costs as appropriate

Each of these costs has been entered into a specialist licence cost spreadsheet developed by the Welsh Licensing Expert Panel, which is used across Wales and has now been adopted by the Local Government Association. The costs calculated using this methodology have not been tested through the courts, but are believed to be sufficiently robust to answer any legal or other concerns.

The fee costs calculated from the 1st August 2017 are shown in column 3 of Appendix 1.

1.9	A number of application, transfer and variation fees have fallen significantly as a result of this calculation process. This has occurred for two main reasons, namely
	1 Previous fees were based on the time taken to administer and enforce new legislation. Officers are now more au fait with this legislation and the processes are accordingly more streamlined
	2 The collaboration with Torfaen County Borough Council is now delivering management and other cost savings that are reflected in the reduced fees for businesses seeking our services.
1.10	Local authorities are not obliged to charge the maximum they have calculated as a reasonable cost recovery level. A lower fee can be charged, but the difference between this lower fee and the cost recovery level must be borne by the authority and cannot be recharged to other businesses. Local Authorities may choose to charge a lower fee for a number of reasons, for example where
	(i) The new fee is significantly higher than the previous fee level, and a graduated increase is considered fairer to businesses,
	(ii) The fee is high and would adversely affect small businesses, or
	(iii) The fee could deter businesses from becoming licensed, and it is more cost effective to reduce fee levels than meet the considerable costs of investigating and enforcing in respect of unlicensed businesses
	Members may wish to consider whether there is a case for the reduction of any gambling licence fee charged by the authority for the forthcoming year.
1.11	Once agreed, the fees approved by Members will be placed on the website and notified to applicants from the 1st August 2017.
	The proposed fees from the 1st August 2017 are shown in column 4 of Appendix 1. For simplicity, these have been rounded down to the nearest £.
2.	Performance Evidence and Information*

The fees calculated will affect 13 existing premises in respect of their annual fees, as follows
